

Regulations for submission of manuscripts and instructions to authors of the journal "Latvijas Zinātņu Akadēmijas Vēstis. A daļa: Humanitārās un sociālās zinātnes" (Proceedings of the Latvian Academy of Sciences. Section A: Humanities and Social Sciences)

> Approved by the Editorial Council of "Proceedings of LAS" on 19 March 2018

General provisions

- "Latvijas Zinātņu Akadēmijas Vēstis" (Proceedings of the Latvian Academy of Sciences) ("Proceedings of LAS") publishes on a regular basis original articles of members of LAS and other authors, including foreign authors, on topical and important research issues, original results and findings of theoretical and applied research, as well as problem articles, reflections on scientific discussions; and informs about current events in the scientific life in Latvia and LAS.
- 2. In the Section A of "Proceedings of LAS", the covered disciplines are: social sciences (philosophy, psychology, law, economics and management, society, journalism, library science, pedagogy and education, political science and other), and humanities (arts, language, literature and folklore, history, architecture and other).
- Contribution of manuscripts to "Proceedings of LAS" is a privilege of members of the LAS. If none of the authors is a member of the LAS, manuscripts should be communicated by a member of LAS by using a special communication form (available at homepage of "Proceedings of LAS", Section A).

Requirements to the content of an article

- 4. An article should be written in clear and academically precise language. Title of an article, key words, content and structure should meet the requirements of a scientific article.
- 5. The **introductory part** of an article should include a statement of a problem, motivation of a need for research, its topicality, methodological approach and the main findings.
- 6. The **outline part** of an article should describe in a consecutive way the solution of the problem. It is advised to structure this part in sub-parts by using titles and subtitles.
- The outline should be developed in a logical sequence, it should be well-considered from the composition aspect, terminologically and factually precise and clear.
- 8. The **concluding part** of an article should provide for concise conclusions, assessments, suggestions, generalisations.
- All necessary references used in the manuscript including those regarding quotations, illustrations, statistical and factual data and appendixes should be indicated and placed in the "Sources and Notes" section.

- 10. Brief information about author(s) in Latvian and English should be attached to the article.
- 11. An article written in language other than English should be completed by a summary in English. Additionally summary in Latvian should be provided to all articles written in language other than Latvian.
- 12. Summary in any other language may be attached to the article, if the Head of the Editorial Office and the Editor-in-Chief of the Part A by objective considerations recognize this necessary and author(s) are able to provide qualitative translation.

Technical requirements

- 1. The Journal accepts for publication articles written in Latvian, English or German.
- 2. Articles should be typed in *Microsoft Word* format or format that is compatible with this format. Editorial Office does not guarantee that specific signs and symbols will be maintained as a result of text conversion, therefore, if such signs or symbols are used and are necessary, an author should timely inform the Editorial Office.
- An article should be within 8000 40 000 characters (the number of characters should be counted according to *Microsoft Word* option *Word Count: Characters with space*).
- 4. Parameters of typing: 12 point letters, *Times New Roman* font, standard spacing and page margins. After a dot, comma, number of year, century as well as between initial letter and surname should be a space one interval. Display type text (in bold, italic, underlined text and similar) should be used consistently, and it is not advised to stuff text with display type writing.
- 5. In Latvian, words "year" and "century" if used together with the number of a year

or century should be written in full. In other languages, specific orthography rules of the relevant language should be respected.

- 6. The advised size of a title three to six words, the text should be typed in block letters starting from the left margin (**bold** option).
- After the title, the author, or authors, should type their full names, followed by his/her surname (both in **bold**) and email address (in *italic*), the text should be placed from the right margin.
- 8. After a one-line spacing, the author's identification is followed by three to five key words as follows: the text **Keywords** is typed in **bold**, then colon and key words typed in *italic*, all text is placed left and finished without a dot.
- 9. After one-line spacing, a short summary in the language of the article should provide, in one or two paragraphs, general information that characterises the analysed problem, theories, methodological approach of a research, highlighted items, etc. A summary is typed without title in *italic*.
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- 11. Omissions in the text should be indicated by double dot in brackets [..].
- 12. Used quotations should be precise, typed in quotation marks from both sides. Omissions should be indicated: short omissions (some words) — by double dot .., while large omissions (several sentences) — by double dot in square brackets [..].
- 13. References that include sources, literature, other notes and explanations, should be placed at the end of a text. They should be created using *Microsoft Word endnote* option.
- 14. Simple tables and figures that are constructed by using standard *Microsoft*

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- 15. Information about author(s) includes: scientific degree, place of work, scientific specialisation, other relevant information.
- 16. A summary in English or Latvian should be structured as follows: title of an article in English (**bold** option, placed left); after one-line spacing — name and surname of author(s) (**bold** option, placed left), next line — e-mail address(es) of author(s) (italics, placed left); after oneline spacing — sub-title **Summary** (**bold**, placed left); after on line spacing - keywords, formatted according to the same rules as in beginning of article (placed left), and the text of the summary in normal shrift. In case author(s) have not provided summary in English or Latvian, such a summary is produced in the Editorial Office by translating from the summary in the language of the article.
- 17. It is advised that an abstract does not exceed 3000 characters. If an author(s) cannot provide translation of an abstract, this will be done by the Editorial Office.
- 18. Articles should be submitted by sending electronically as an attachment, or via other file transferring facilities, or personally, deposited in a data media.

References

1. Accuracy of references is the responsibility of author(s). 2. References in Cyrillic are not accepted. Such references should be typed using Latin letters.

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- 3. Reference or note should be finished by only one dot (dot with abbreviation of "pages" (lpp., p. or other depending on the language of a source) or in the end of a sentence).
- 4. In references recognised abbreviations in Latin or Latvian may be used.
- 5. Repeating reference to the previous source is constructed as follows: Ibid., number(s) of relevant page(s) with the unit of measurement (for instance, p. for publication in English or relevant to the language of publication).
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- 7. Instructions for reproduction sources of references (print and marks in the reproduction formula as it should be in reference)
